SOUTH AFRICA

This is a study abroad opportunity where SPC students will get to experience a different culture and learn in a foreign context. Particular attention would be paid to relations between, and comparison of, the South African and the United States economies. The South African experience can inform economic life in different settings and different historical events. Beyond an introduction to key theories and concepts of macroeconomics, we will compare each county's Central Bank, Gross Domestic Product, environmental and economic development concerns, and race and economic inequality issues among other characteristics.

Generally, students can look forward to visiting Robben Island, a symbol of human resilience in the face of adversity. It is the place where South Africa's post-Apartheid first democratically elected president Nelson Mandela spent 18 years of his 27 years of incarceration. Other sites include the world-famous Kruger National Park, an example of conservation effort in the world; Iziko Slave Lodge; the Cradle of Mankind, a UNESCO World Heritage site; District 6 Museum; the Reserve Bank of South Africa, and many more.

SPC 2019-20 CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION

According to SPC Catalog 2019-20, ECO 2013 Principles of Macroeconomics is a course in economic principles involving the overall operation of the market economy. Particular attention will be given to the effects of aggregate demand and aggregate supply on the levels of output, employment, and prices. This course will also examine how the tools of fiscal and monetary policy may be used in dealing with macroeconomics problems such as unemployment, inflation and economic fluctuation. Homework Assignments and Chapter Quizzes (in MyEconLab)

Students will be required to register on MyEconLab, and complete assigned Homework Assignments and Chapter Quizzes. The points from MyEconLab assignments will be added to the total points on MyCourses.

Written Discussion Forums (in MyCourses)

Students will be required to contribute their entries to a discussion forum in MyCourses on selected topics. Discussion lists will be closed after the due date.

Unit Exams (in MyEconLab)

Students will be required to take objective (multiple choice) Unit Exams covering three or four chapters comprising each unit. Unit Exams will be conducted in MyEconLab. Unit Exams are timed, so if you take a break, your exam time will continue to expire just as it would in an exam you were taking in class. The points from MyEconLab assignments will be added to the total points on MyCourses.

COMMUNICATION PROJECT (in MyCourses)

Students have a choice of four methods to communicate their academic findings:

- 1. **Paper** The first choice is a traditional paper in MLA or APA format. Students who write papers must work on their own (no group papers allowed) and will be required to submit the paper in electronic form in the Research Paper Dropbox.
- 2. **Video** An acceptable alternative is an individual or group video posted on YouTube. Students who create videos will be asked to show the video and discuss their findings. Sometimes students share their research findings with the help of presentation software (e.g. PowerPoint, Prezi, or Google Slides) with the class.
- 3. **Podcast** Another acceptable alternative is an individual or group podcast. A podcast is like a recorded radio show. Students who create podcasts will be asked to play the podcast and show related pictures during playback.
- 4. **Presentation** Another acceptable alternative is an individual or group presentation. Students share their research findings with the help of presentation software (e.g. PowerPoint, Prezi, or Google Slides) with the class. Most face-to-face students pick this option.

<u>Late Communication Projects will absolutely not be accepted under any circumstances.</u>

A student may earn extra credit for participating in written and online verbal discussions "over and beyond" the stated requirements. Extra Credit may also be earned for attending department-sponsored events (probably online). Extra Credit opportunities will be announced throughout the term.
