

SPC 2022-23 Catalog Course Description

INR 2002 International Relations. Prerequisite: POS 2041. This course is an introductory study of the factors that affect relations among nations, including the development of nationalism; the elements that determine national power; the formulation of foreign policy; the art of diplomacy; the history and application of international law; international economics; international organizations; militarism and war; case studies involving the above; and contemporary events in international relations. (Note: This course partially satisfies the writing requirements outlined in the General Education Requirements. Credit is only given for INR 2002 or INR 2002H. Study Abroad opportunities may apply to this course (https://blog.spcollege.edu/international/study-abroad/).

Course objectives and Major Learning Outcomes

- 1. The student will demonstrate knowledge of various theories central to the understanding of international relations as a field of study.
- 2. The student will demonstrate an understanding of the development of the nationstate system and the elements of power that determine a nation's international effectiveness.
- 3. The student will demonstrate knowledge of the theories and practicalities that shape foreign policy and the application of foreign policy through diplomatic conduct.
- 4. The student will demonstrate knowledge of the historical development of international law and the agencies of its application today.
- 5. The student will demonstrate a basic understanding of the operation of international economics. The student will demonstrate an understanding of international development as it relates to emerging nations in the global economic system.
- 6. The student will demonstrate knowledge of the concerns found in international environmental politics and the aspects of global interdependence.
- 7. The student will demonstrate an understanding of the purpose, objectives and organization of the major international bodies.
- 8. The student will demonstrate knowledge of integration in the international system as it relates to regional or global unions.
- 9. The student will demonstrate an understanding of the causes and effects of war and international conflict.
- 10. The student will demonstrate an understanding of contemporary international problems based on methods developed in the course.

Japan

Though this course deals with International Relations (IR), as part of study abroad, it will specifically focus on Japan. Through this study abroad opportunity, where SPC students will get to experience a different culture and learn in a foreign context, attention would be paid to relations between Japan, its neighbors, and the United States and how the Japan experience can inform life in different settings such as the U.S. Beyond an introduction to key theories and concepts of IR, such as states and non-state actors, the course will attempt to cover topics such as the modern Japanese state, the place of Japan in world affairs, and international cooperation, to name a few.

Generally, students can look forward to visiting multiples historical sites dealing with political, economic, and social issues in Japan. This includes Himeji Castle, Japan's largest castle; the city of Hiroshima where the atomic bomb was dropped on August 6, 1945; various Shinto shrines and Buddhist temples found throughout the country and many more as detailed in the accompanying program itinerary.

Class assignments [SUBJECT TO CHANGE PRIOR TO COURSE START]

- 1. **Discussion posts** (*200 points*): students will be required to contribute to a discussion forum in MyCourses on selected topics.
- 2. **Team player behavior** (*200 points*): in this travel course, students are always expected to behave professionally and be respectful of other people cultures. This is a team trip and while students are expected to enjoy this journey, it is paramount that they follow all rules and procedures for their own safety.
- 3. **Japan pre-departure student guide** (*200 points*): before departing for Japan, students are expected to develop their trip guide. The graded trip guide should be well researched and comprehensive. It should provide students enough information about the country, culture, customs, political system, and so on that would be helpful to them during this trip. *Expected length: 1,000 words*.
- 4. **Post-trip critical reflection** (*400 points*): one week after returning from the trip, students are expected to critically reflect on their Japanese experience. Further details will be provided in time. Students will then share their experience during our debriefing session back here in the USA. *Expected length: 1,500-2,000 words*.
